SAME Engineering & Construction camps provide a rigorous experience for high school students interested in exploring STEM skills and careers. Campers gain a sense of what it takes to become a STEM professional and what options exist to explore that interest from high school to college and beyond. Each camp has a unique curriculum that features hands-on activities conducted in a competitive environment that encourages Teamwork, Leadership, Project Management and Problem Solving.

The Engineering and Construction Camps provide students an opportunity to broaden their engineering knowledge and apply problem solving techniques while competing among their teams.

Since 2013, the Post has sent a number of local students and mentors to these camps. This summer we sent Robbie O'Bryan, a junior at Titusville High School who hopes to pursue a career in engineering. Teamwork was the core theme of this year's U.S. Air Force Academy Camp held in Colorado Springs. All aspects of the camp encompassed this value and each group was evaluated on their team work. Robbie's team ranked 4th in Teamwork, but I am sure the competition was very high.



I am proud to report that Robbie was assigned team leader for the Dog House competition and ranked first in their flight. Perhaps this is an early sign of a great project manager in the making?

The canoe competition appeared to be the most fun and even with an overturned cardboard vessel, his team placed 2nd in the race to the finish line.

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Post Monthly Meeting Recap

July: UFC Fire Protection Requirements Doug Fisher, FPE, Fisher Engineering

UFC 3-600-01 went through a complete rewrite in 2016. Both Government and private industry users are still misunderstanding and misapplying the requirements. The presentation explained why UFC 3-600-01 was rewritten and reorganized, its purpose and applicability, and its use by both the DoD and private industry. Highlights shared included the difference between AHJ, DFPE (Gov't FPE) and QFPE (private industry FPE), DoD's responsibilities before sending out an RFP for design/build or construction, clarification on the interaction between building code and NFPA 101, and changes to the fire protection and fire alarm system criteria. All attendees were able to receive 1 PDH.

August: How Knowledge of Military Budgets Can Increase Your Opportunities to Win Work Jeff Duguid, RLF Architecture Engineering Interiors

Military construction budgets are filled with valuable insight on what you will soon find on FBO.gov. Understanding how to find this critical (and FREE!) intel allows you to build a pipeline of opportunities and more importantly, position your team for a win BEFORE the solicitation is advertised. This presentation provided the knowledge necessary to get ahead of solicitation advertisements and demonstrated steps to uncover knowledge about upcoming projects.

September: LIDAR Scanning Technology in Design Anthony Romero, LEED AP, Rhodes & Brito

LIDAR (Light Detection and Range or Light, Imaging, Detection and Range) is a remote sensing method that uses light in the form of a pulsed laser to measure ranges. The presentation provided a general overview of field practices when using LIDAR scanner and registration software as well as integrating the data with CAD and BIM software in design activities.

John Constantinide with Alpha MRC provided a debrief of the SAME Post Leadership Workshop and desired Post Action Plan in accordance with the national SAME vision and 2025 strategic plan.
